It's great to report on a fine year, and some of your Association's plans going forward.

We've continued to see our umpires well represented in national and international competition. The individual highlight is our provincial umpire supervisor,

Steve Boutang, getting a terrific assignment to the 18U World Cup tournament in Taiwan. There are very few international assignments available, so getting one is itself a mark of high achievement. Steve represented us, and indeed baseball in Canada, very well.

On the national front, we again had a good number of assignments, and our umpires at nationals showed the strength of our program in BC, and their own achievements, with some profile assignments on the final day of many of the tournaments.

Provincially, we provided umpires for a wide range of provincial tournaments, and this year more than ever provided supervision, evaluation, mentoring and education at the tournaments, with umpires gaining confidence and improving their game. At the same time, we provided our league clients with some top quality officiating. I really encourage every umpire to consider applying for a provincial tournament next year.

We're going to see some changes in our board next year, and one of those is in the post of treasurer. We will welcome Sean Sullivan as our new treasurer, but first I want to thank Fabian Poulin for his years of service in that role. Fabian has served this association with distinction in that role, and deserves our thanks for his service. But much more than that, Fabian is retiring from an umpire career that is distinguished on and off the field. He leaves our association with wonderful friends and memories, and we wish him well as he leaves his umpire equipment behind.

We are happy to welcome Don Hass and Rob Allan as assistant provincial supervisors. We thank Troy Carmont for his service in that role, and before that as co-supervisor for more than a year. Don and Rob will be working with Steve Boutang, and also carrying out a number of functions on behalf of the BCBUA. Notably among these, Rob Allan has agreed to become the new chair of our very active Education Committee.

Our registration system and data base were renewed this year, and we think most of the adjustment and growing pains are behind us. We're continuing to expand our use of our data base, and this year will move to on-line exams, for instance. We thank George Smith, our Secretary, and Adam DeBray, our technical resource, for all their efforts. And of course, our webmaster, Brian Cargnelli, who has worked with George and Adam to integrate our different systems. Brian and Steve are currently putting together a new workbook, which we think will be a useful aid in and after clinics.

We've made a change to our level system going forward. Umpires who attain level 2 and level 3 and remain continuous BCBUA members, will retain the level that they achieved, even if they don't refresh all of their qualifications each year. We do want to encourage umpires to keep their levels current, and there are still incentives to do so. All umpires are expected to refresh their knowledge each year, and one of the best ways to do that is to write the exam for their level. We hope this works even better with an on-line exam. Of course, clinics are another great way to learn and renew!

Umpires wanting to progress to the next level (eg level 2 to 3 or level 3 to 4), must be current with all of their present level's requirements. Finally, for provincial tournaments or anything else allocated by BCBUA, preference will be given to umpires who meet their present level's requirements on a current basis.

Congratulations to every umpire who worked to make baseball a wonderful sport for players, coaches, spectators and other officials.

# **NO SUPERCLINIC OR ADVANCED CLINIC IN THE LOWER MAINLAND**

The BCBUA board of directors have decided that neither the Superclinic nor an Advanced Clinic will be held in 2014 for the Lower Mainland due to what is perceived as an oversaturation of the market. Last year the attendance at Superclinic was down significantly and through analysis it was decided that we needed to take a break from that for-

mat for a while. But please be aware that we are not abandoning the Superclinic format, just taking a break for this upcoming year at least.

As for an advanced clinic, if there is interest we will be holding one in the Interior sometime in the Spring of 2014. If you are required to attend an advanced clinic this year to either qualify or maintain your Level 3 standing, then you will need to attend this clinic if it is held. "Wait, let me get my hat....OK , what are these momentous changes?"

"The GGDT has decided that we need to streamline our process a bit so we can go fully online with our Level 2 & 3 written exams in 2014. To do this we need to allow something that permits some members to be Grandfathered into their various Levels. I don't understand all the 1s & 0s of computer speak but I am informed that this is necessary."

"Oops, darn...I dropped my hat. Is it OK if I put my hat down? It is hard to etch while I am holding it.?

"Yes, yes.....Here it is. Starting in 2014 any member who has achieved Level 2 or Level 3 prior to 2014 will be considered a permanent Level 2 or 3 as long as they maintain their BCBUA membership without interruption. This means that for those who are grandfathered into their individual level they will no longer be required to write an exam, be evaluated or attend an Advanced Clinic to **MAINTAIN** their level. However to advance to the next level, be it Level 3 or Level 4 the member must become current in all the required elements of such an advancement."

"Doesn't this leave the door wide open for a member to take the easy road and only pay their money to stay where they are?"

"Yes, there will be a certain number of

members who will do just that but they are not going to clinics (for the most part) anyway. This change will be a test in itself in that it will now be up to the member to choose between the path that leads to stagnation and a deterioration of their skills, knowledge and ability or to continue on the learning path and improve their skills, knowledge and ability."

"What incentive, [meaning what's in it for me], is there to continue on the learning path and not choose to be grandfathered?"

"There are a couple of benefits to being a current Level 2 or 3. One is that there can be no advancement without being current in all your qualifications and the other is that current Level 2 or 3s will get preference over grandfathered Level 2 or 3s in all assignments made by BCBUA."

"You used the term "current" several times, what does it mean?"

"OK, let me see if I can explain this concept. A grandfathered member is someone who achieved their level, be it 2 or 3, some time in the past few years (that we have records for) but have failed to maintain those qualifications. As long as they have had CONTINOUS MEMBERSHIP since then we will credit them with the highest Provincial level they have achieved.

For example, Joe Bloe achieved a Level 2 in 2005 but, although he has maintained his membership he has not written a Level 2 exam since. As long as his membership has remained unbroken since 2005 he would become a grandfathered Level 2. If he wished to advance to Level 3 he would then have write and pass his Level 2 exam before he could move on.

It is a little bit more complex for a Level 3 because there are more requirements. For instance if Joe's sister Jane had an evaluation done in 2004 and attended the Advanced Clinic in 2005 but didn't pass the exam till 2006 then 2006 would be the year that she had **ALL** of the Level 3 requirements and would then be grandfathered to Level 3 as of 2006 as long as her membership was continuous. Clear?"

"As mud! If I am confused and I need some answers could I call you?"

"Yes. My name is Bill MacMillan and my contact info is on the BCBUA website. I don't do texts!"

"Oh, how Neanderthal. Was there anything else at the GGDT?"

"Since you ask, yes. They decided to continue both the Mentorship Program and the 3 Umpire Project for 2014 and the date for the Annual General Meeting is November 17 @ noon somewhere in Victoria. Keep an eye on the Hey Blue! for details."

"Wow, I had better get this to press. Thanks for the call Mr. L3C...or can I call you Bill?"

"No you may not, Mr. Beaver. Carry on!"

# **New Assistant Supervisors Announced**

BCBUA Provincial Supervisor of Umpires Steve Boutang has announced a new supervisor team for the province. Rob Allan and Don Hass will act as Assistant Supervisors to Boutang beginning immediately.

Boutang says it was necessary to add 2 assistants following the resignation of former assistant Troy Carmont in April.



"There are a lot of responsibilities in this position, and time commitments that I can't manage on my own. Besides, Rob and Don bring a tremendous wealth of information, experience, and knowledge that I really wanted to have as part of the team going forward".

Allan will also take over the role of Education Chair on the BCBUA Board. He will not be running for re-election as Area Rep for Area 3.

The 2013 baseball season brought 5 complaints to my attention this year.

Two of the complaints were dropped because they did not fit the criteria for umpire misconduct.

Two more of the complaints were investigated thoroughly but neither

of them warranted any action by the discipline committee.

The final complaint was the result of a long standing issue between an official and a coaching staff that was not an actual misconduct allegation but rather a request for mediation assistance. The teachable moment that came from this year's issues is that when situations on field get tense, as officials we should always be very conscious of our proximity to coaches and players. Contact during such times can be viewed differently by each of the participants.

## **BERRY ACCLAIMED AS PRESIDENT**

Under the new bylaws, 2013 represents the first year in which candidates for Table Officer positions must declare their intention to run for election prior to September 1. John Berry was the sole person who filed nomination papers for the position of President. Berry enters his 6<sup>th</sup> term as President after having served the past 10 years as President of the BCBUA.

# SULLIVAN JOINS AS TREASURER

Delta's Sean Sullivan was acclaimed to the position of Treasurer for a 2 year term. Sullivan was the lone person to file nomination papers by the deadline. Outgoing Treasurer Fabian Poulin of Nanaimo indicated in August his intention to retire from the BCBUA.

# POULIN ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT



After a fantastic 32 year career as an umpire, Fabian Poulin announced his retirement from baseball at the BC Sr Men's Provincials in Victoria. Poulin was part of the National program for 23 years and attended 10 National championships during his tenure. He also complet-

ed the rare National cycle in which he umpired at all the National tournaments from Peewee to Senior. Only Jerry Tregaskis had been able to complete the cycle prior to 2013.



Concussions are increasing at an alarming rate around baseball. Players are being concussed more often, and guess what? So are umpires. Truth.

Several of our own BCBUA umpires have been concussed this year and last, being hit in the head area by pitches primarily. This can happen at any level of baseball, although mostly these specific injuries are as a result of higher levels of baseball where the balls are travelling at greater velocity.

It has nothing to do with poor equipment or protection, or umpires bailing out at the last second. Yes, there are better masks out there than others, but that dreaded concussion. concussions still happen with these products.

Mainly, it happens because of the whiplash effect (among other things) whereby a foul ball goes screaming past the catcher and directly onto the face and head area of the umpire, snapping the head backwards.

I'm not a doctor, but I can tell you that concussions are growing because the symptoms and signs

were often ignored in the past, and now people are getting checked and diagnosed more frequently. And the effects are dramatic the more it happens. And the symptoms take longer to dissipate the more times you get your melon rattled.

If you do some research on umpire positioning you will discover that the best position to avoid getting hit is the "slot position". That's the position where the middle of your body is positioned basically on the inside corner of the plate. The best way to accomplish

this is by working in the "Box Stance -Heel/Toe" with your head and back slightly leaning forward. The more you hide behind the catcher, the more likely you are to get hit ironically enough.... And if you get too low and hide behind the catcher completely, then you can't see the pitches.

If you work in a position where your head is slightly above the catcher, on the inside portion of the plate, slightly exposed, it is almost physically impossible to get hit in the head under normal foul ball circumstances.

Thus, reducing your chance of getting

Some people like the "Gerry Davis" style stance. Yes, you see the pitches And before you get your bell rung, go to the doctor. There are base line tests out there that will measure your brain functions when you are healthy. Go get one done. That way, when you have a concussion, the doctors have a place to start their measurements and can tell you how bad your injury is.

When you do have that bad experience when you get hit, for pete sakes go to the doctor and get checked. And TAKE TIME OFF of baseball! That includes the bases. I'm not joking here! Coming back too soon exacerbates this condition.

Finally, think of the rest of your life. Baseball is a hobby. Yes we take it seriously. But it's a game. Your family,

> your health, and the rest of your life are way more important to look after.

better because you are basically more upright, looking almost overtop of the catcher's head. But you are too exposed to foul balls in this position. You'll get hit on the arms and head much more, and it's dangerous.

MLB is asking their umpires to get away from this stance. And so am I.

Try hard this winter to develop a good, solid box stance-heel toe stance. And in spring, when the season begins anew, start working this style and stay safe!

After many years of faithful service, the BCBUA Executive have decided to retire our old clinic manuals in order to go in a new direction. After much debate, the education committee has appointed Brian Cargnelli and Steve Bou-

tang to develop a new workbook for each of the levels. The manual for Level 1 will be a workbook style while the Level 2 Manual will be more of a discussion and scenario interpretation handout. The idea behind both manuals is that as the Education Committee develops new teaching tools and areas of interest, they can be incorporated easily into the new manuals each year. Thus a student who has already attended the Level 2 clinic in the


