Secretary's Report—2020 By Les Maerov

Total Membership for 2020 was 1331—a decrease from the total of 1618 in 2019.

There were a total of 48 clinics completed in one form or another... either in person or online. There was 1 High Level clinic completed prior to the pandemic shutdown. The National clinic, Umpire Academy and Advanced clinics were cancelled.

It is unknown how many members or clinics we can expect to have in 2021 and this will largely depend on the state of the pandemic, the restrictions and health orders, and the number of registrants in baseball on the whole.



BCBUA Revenues Reported: :\$82,850.00

BCBUA Expenditures Reported: :\$39,215.20

Total profit/loss: +\$43,634.80

Total overall cash position of BCBUA: +\$81,024.00

It is important to note that even though BCBUA showed a large "profit" on paper and that we show a large surplus in the bank account, BCBUA expects to show an equally large "deficit" in 2021 given a number of factors regarding Covid and a move from in-person clinics to a new Virtual Clinic platform and the costs associated.

-President's Report

At the risk of starting this report in the same manner as every other report you will read today, 2020 sure has been full of learning for us. However, I will also tell you that your leadership team here has done an outstanding job of adapting and managing the changes that this year has brought.

First up is your board of directors. The board has met at least once a month since April, and in several months twice. Even the members who don't use technology had to adapt to using Microsoft Teams and Zoom in order to do their jobs.

We had some UIC's really step up. They knew that in some cases their new L1 umpires had not gotten a mechanics clinic or any feedback on their practice from online. They had no idea about our new modified mechanics

These are people who probably wanted to get onto the field themselves but chose to support our new members first as their priority. I would like to thank Baseball BC, and specifically David Laing for his leadership as the Executive Director of our PSO during this pandemic. The revolving door of changing regulations and constant updated communication that he has had to keep up with has been challenging to say the least.

GEARHEADS—

For Those Who Can't Get Enough By Brad Jones

As the craziness of 2020 comes to an end, we, as umpires, can hope that things will change for the better, and we are back on the field in 2021. When that happens, have you checked your gear and made a list of what will be needed to be changed or upgraded by next spring.

If major gear ends up on your list, All-star has a Christmas lineup for you by making a big splash in the GearHeads world with the introduction of their Cobalt line of protective gear.

Following, All-star's trail-blazing Mag mask, the Cobalt line brings a trail-blazing and initiative set of protective gear with a new plate helmet (cap), chest protector (CP) and shin guards (SG).

The Mag mask has the hit of the market last year and become a leader by offering a molded (2-piece) magnesium mask that only has two welds at the ear plates. The funky cage has tapered tubing that is designed to assist in the dispersion of the force from a direct blow to the head. Complementing this, the Mag's oversided mask pads complete its distinct look and gives it a thumbs up for being a light, protective and cool looking lid. All-star added a companion to the Mag with the Cobalt Skully, a short-brimmed helmet that fills the niche of umpires wanting a hard-shell cap for their traditional mask without be a safety hazard.

The biggest concern of longer brimmed batting and coaches helmets is that when there is a blow to the mask, the cage will transfer the force to the brim of the helmet and then to your head and brain. The Skully, with a cool, flat-black gritty finish, has a short 2-inch brim that brings separation from the helmet to the cage of the mask that will eliminate the force transfer.



Also, it has removable, washable pads that can be adjusted and changed. It comes in four sizes: small (6 $\frac{3}{4}$ to 7), medium (7 to 7 $\frac{1}{8}$), large (7 $\frac{1}{4}$ to 7 $\frac{3}{8}$) and extra-large (7 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 7 $\frac{5}{8}$). It is retailing \$60 US.

Comparing the Skully, to the Un-cap hard -shell liner for traditional caps, I would have to give the thumbs up to the Skully. The un-cap did not fit well to my head and kept falling off when I took off my mask. In contrast, I find the Skully comfortable and firmly sits on my head and does not move when taking off my mask.

Some have suggested going to a neoprene mask harness for the Skully, but I find my normal harness does not slip on its textured finish.

While the Skully will be a major player in my bag, the biggest chatter of the Cobalt line has been spent on the Cobalt Chest Protector. This CP has been called a game changer, as it takes its linage from the holy grail of CPs, the Riddell Power. The Power has been long valued for its design and innovation at the time, but Wilson was able to turn the Power into the Avro Arrow of CPs through legal laws suits over patents. Sadly, Riddell had to cease making the Power and its value and legend has driven its value to about \$800-\$1,000 US on the re-sale market.

The All-star Cobalt CP morphs the Power into the 21st century and finally gives GearHeads a low-profile CP that gives fully adjustability and customization. The pre-curved shoulder sections ensure proper clavicle protection, and the memory-forming hard armour will give a better fit to umpires that bulky CPs lack. The major innovation in this CP is the patented padding system that is designed to venting the CP on hot days on the dish. The Cobalt CP also has optional pit pads and lower extension to give you the options to get the right fit.

Anderson takes helm of Level 3

Kyle Anderson, Area 9 Director, has stepped in to the leadership role of the Level 3 program of BCBUA. The Prince George resident takes over from the retiring Bill MacMillan who left the post in fall following 23 years as the Level 3 co-ordinator and 25 years on the BCBUA board. Anderson himself is a level 3 umpire with aspirations of moving into the National program. He will take over a robust program that has shown tremendous stability from the years of stewardship of Bill MacMillan. His contact information is available on the BCBUA website.

UICS to receive assistance

BCBUA also announced at the AGM that local UIC's around the province will receive additional assistance in completing their umpire training programs this year. Due to the pandemic, in person class work will not take place and will instead be moved on line. Mechanics sessions and training will take place in person with Area Reps and qualified BCBUA instructors. Additional resources will be provided to UIC's for ongoing learning throughout the season.

MEMBER REFUNDS UPDATE

Due to the pandemic most of our youth members didn't get an opportunity to either take clinics or get onto the field in a meaningful way last season. For some people it was their first year as members. To that end, the BCBUA determined that refunds were in order for all youth umpires 14 years old and under, and any brand new members.

The BCBUA Board refunded almost \$7,000 in member dues to those youths who applied through the process in 2020. Additionally, any umpire who was 14 and under in 2020 will automatically have their paid membership rolled over to the 2021 season at no further charge. Much work (and expense) is incurred annually to provide a high quality experience to our membership and to that end we have done the best we can to mitigate losses to umpires while allowing our association to remain solvent in the upcoming seasons.



Baseball Canada News.....

Across the country, Provincial umpire leaders are busy working towards the 2021 season. The 5 portfolios all report substantial work being completed on various projects. Grassroots indicates that online level 3 materials will be ready for release this spring on the new Baseball Canada platform. Instructor Development Portfolio reports that all Caravans have been put on hold until next winter due to the pandemic... but also that work continues with ongoing training packages for supervisors as well as the development of the Sr Course Conductor Pathway Program.

High Performance has plans for a new National umpire clinic which will be piloted in Kamloops in spring 2022 and will feature up and coming umpires in the National programma first for the country.

At \$180 US, the Cobalt's only concern is its location of the lower buckles for the harness. Many are concerned about the possibility of the lower plastic buckles breaking from a hard shot to them. However, you can go online and find a fix for this concern with some strapping and Chicago screws.

Finally, the Cobalt line complements the low-profile CP with low-profile shin guards. These SGs snug your legs with a memory forming hard-shell protection while being designed to give good ventilation during hot days.

The biggest feature of these SGs is the weight of a pair of these guards. Coming in three sizes (15", 17" and 19"), these SGs weight between 2 to 2 ½ pounds per pair and are retailing at \$100 US. As you see, lots of gear choices on the market today!

A new Superclinic format will be available this spring for all level 3 umpires across the country. In a revolutionary partnership between the country's two leading education programs, BCBUA and Baseball Ontario have partnered to offer a virtual Superclinic experience to our membership in 2021!

It's the first of its kind and will allow umpires to maintain their level 3 qualifications by attending a clinic once every three years. Further, the quality of instruction and materials may even be better than an in-person clinic due to the tremendous new platform which will be utilized to deliver the materials.

In 1995, Bill MacMillan was at the annual Superclinic in Vancouver when he approached then-Provincial Supervisor Howard Chapman about creating a spot on the BCBUA Board of Directors for an Area Director position for the Kootenay region of the province. Howard had that power in those days. That event came to be at the fall AGM.

I would hardly imagine that Bill figured he would still be on the board in 2020—some 25 years later. However, after a quarter century as the Area Director for the Kootenays he is. Or should I say, he was. Bill retired from the board at the fall AGM, marking the conclusion of the longest consecutive term of any BCBUA board member in history.

Bill served in several different roles on our board, the most prominent being as the Level 3 co-ordinator, a position he held for most of those 25 years. Our level 3 program is one of the top programs in the country thanks in no small part to Bill's diligence over the years.

You probably didn't know this. Our Discipline Policy, Appeals Process, Supervisor Guide Book, Evaluators Program, and a boatload of the Superclinic and Educational programs we use today were spearheaded or authored by guess who? If you guessed Bill MacMillan you'd win a prize.

Many of the bright ideas we use today for Mentorship, Giving Back, Grass-roots development, and participation of our National umpires were authored by and came directly from the long conversations Bill and I had during our hours-long drives from the Kootenays to Kamloops or the Lower Mainland for BCBUA-related business and meetings. So yes, you have Bill to thank for that too!

Bill rarely missed a board meeting over the years. And certainly in the last 10 years or so he had become a really key member of the board, often providing clarity of historical import to conversations and decision making, and helping steer the board into making the right decisions instead of the wrong ones.

He helped me be a better supervisor too. He kept me from making an ass of myself more times than I care to count. He showed me unwavering support. He became like a father-figure to me in baseball and for that I am eternally grateful.

Bill, we wish you well in the future and hope for nothing but enjoyment in your retirement with Patsy, your family, and your grandkids. We will miss your input and your contributions, and certainly your sense of humour and wit. But we know you are just a phone call away when we need some of that sense of direction we are sometimes lacking.

PCBUA YEAR—END BALL GAME

Despite a rainout of the originally scheduled event, 20 PCBUA umpires were joined by 4 friends of PCBUA to partake in a fantasy baseball opportunity as the group played an intra-squad game on the diamond at historic Nat Bailey stadium on Saturday October 3rd.

Two teams made from 21 players were managed respectively by event organizer Corey Klein and PCBUA President Phil Bourgeois.

Joe Mallinson led things off for Team Bourgeois, while wearing a working prototype of the special protective gear specifically designed to counter Joe's penchant for attracting baseballs to him, particularly in the head area. The display prompted rumours of a potential new line of protective umpire gear based on the successful prototype.

The game remained scoreless until the bottom of the 2nd inning, when a potential side-effect of Mallinson's new equipment took him in the wrong direction while fielding a fly ball, turning a likely fly out into a leadoff triple to start off the inning. Team Klein did not squander the scoring opportunity and subsequently pushed the run across to take a 1-0 lead.

Bourgeois sparked an immediate response for his team in the top half of the 3rd, lacing his own leadoff double over the left fielder's head, eventually scoring to tie the game at 1.

The next notable action came in the top of the 5th inning. Chilliwack UIC Mark Luknowsky, who was likely the busiest on-field umpire in BC in 2020, showed the value of seeing pitches and having game reps by registering a 2-out, RBI single to give the visitors a 3-1 lead as part of a 2-run inning.

Team Klein responded in kind in the bottom half of the 5th, putting 2 runners in scoring position. A swinging bunt generated an overthrow, which was coupled with spectator interference by former co-Supervisor Troy Carmont, and resulted in a 2-run response to tie the game at 3.

A bit of fatigue and sloppy play in the next couple of innings resulted in Team Bourgeois scoring 3 times in the 6th, and once in the 7th to take a 7-3 lead into the final at bat for Team Klein, and Mallinson toed the rubber to try and record the final 3 outs.

It wasn't going to be that simple for Mallinson, who couldn't recall it ever being so difficult to throw a ball 60 feet before. Team Klein put together a scrappy inning, narrowing the gap to 7-5 and advancing the tying run to 1st base, before the final out was recorded for the nerve-wracking victory.

Pat Cascio acted as the BSU and Gilles Verret was the Plate Umpire, using the BCBUA-approved COVID-19 mechanics. Both turned in a quality umpiring performance.

Of note, Trevor Sharpe struck out on an eephus pitch from Andrew Brock, which MIGHT have been recorded at 50mph. It certainly was not going to break a pane of glass. Trevor made up for that by throwing out a stealing Nick Van Dyk at 2nd base to end the 6th, despite Nick's protestations that he wasn't tagged in time. Replay (and this writer) both state otherwise Nick; you were out!
